<u>COURSE TITLE</u> New Media in Theory and Practice

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course takes both a hands-on and a theoretical approach to the topic of new media, looking in particular at the ways in which new media transforms text, image, sound, and performance. We will begin by exploring the concept of media and mediums and the difference between old and new media. Throughout the semester we will consider how new media changes the way we experience our own identity and the world. In addition to classroom discussion and activities, students will also work on semester-long projects creating and reflecting on new media in the form of blogs and podcasts.

TEXTS

William Shakespeare, *Pericles*. All other texts will be made available on e-reserve unless otherwise noted.

REQUIREMENTS

New Media Projects

You will be working on two different new media projects – a blog and a podcast – throughout most of the semester. Together they count for a significant part of your grade. Just as the kind of writing you find outside a classroom would often fall far short of the scholarly expectations of a university, so too with these now popular media. Both projects require the same rigor and intellectual approach expected of any work in a university, in some case more since you have to learn new technology and methodology while resisting the norm that these mediums sometimes convey. Both projects will be explained in detail in separate handouts. Briefly, you must create a purposeful blog and post 2 posts per week in your blog (one following the assignment, one "free blog") and create a podcast that will focus on the Theater Studies production of *Pericles* this semester. You will also be required to help create an online dictionary of terms for the class

Class Participation

Students are expected to participate in class discussions and to complete assignments on a regular basis. Each of these activities are equally weighted with respect to grading. Also, attendance is expected at all classes, media training sessions, and the performance of *Pericles* November 28-December 2 (8pm). You will also be expected to seek out individual help from tech support where necessary.
